



Summer reflections

With around 65% more rain than normal for six consecutive months, it's fair to say this really has been a very wet summer! Nothing, though, could dampen the festive spirit that permeated The Bay as it celebrated Canada 150 at the start of July.

However, the challenges of getting ready for the season between downpours slowed boat traffic by about 30%, says Roger White at Rideau Breeze, even before the brief closures of locks and Brass Point Bridge. On the plus side, those who braved the forecasts and came anyway have reported even better fishing than in past years. This has been a bonus for the mainly US visitors to Melody Lodge on Cranberry Lake, where owner James Miao has actually seen a 20% increase in bookings.

Inevitably, with the reduction in boaters and fewer sunny days, the politest thing Dale Moore at Nest Egg had to say about ice cream sales was "disappointing". She did add, though, that the last few weeks have been great, with the pleasure of many familiar faces. And there should still be ice cream available till Thanksgiving.

Doug Brooks at Burnt Hills Farm has had a great season for garlic and four times last year's yield of blueberries. But his tomatoes are not yet ripe, with spotting to foliage and spoiling of some fruit. Pragmatically, he quipped that "farmers always have something to complain about! Last year it was too much heat, this year too much water, next year who knows..."

C21st Community

Talking for the last newsletter to both Barry Davies and Danny Roantree about what's changed and what's stayed the same in Seeley's Bay over the last 50 years, I was struck by the challenges to maintaining that sense of community that is the lifeblood of any village or small town.

In the past, farming was at the core of multigenerational continuance. More recently, farms have grown bigger but fewer. Businesses that supported that larger farming community have fallen away – from the multiple barber shops and gas stations to the cheese factory and, most recently, the bank. Some, like Main Street Hardware have evolved and remain part of village life. And new businesses have sprung up, though many are driven by an

individual dream; their capacity for continuance may be more fragile than when an enterprise passed from generation to generation.

Back in the 1960s, it was individuals in the community who made things happen. Centennial Park was created from the ideas and labour freely given by local people, as well as village fundraising. Legislation, bureaucracy and an evolution from what was community driven to what is 'held' by the township have had a significant impact on how community can operate, what individuals can do.

Looking to the future, Danny hopes that Seeley's Bay will remain a friendly, attractive village and fishing area to which people continue to return year after year, filled with good memories of childhood.

Barry stressed the need for continuance, especially in food

production, backed by proper governmental support for revitalization. Community spirit and a genuine interest in developing the village remain key too.

As a newcomer, I see real strengths in Seeley's Bay; so many great people are trying to make things happen - activities, events, improvements. There are opportunities, and with them real possibility of regeneration. When we were house-hunting, though, in another village, someone drew my attention to a potential divide between lake-dwelling incomers and other residents. My hope is for a community for all, able and willing to bridge that gap.

I'll end with an important question, posed by Barry, for each of us; "how can we, as individuals and as a community, be proactive rather than reactive in the next 50 years?"



Back to school and back from the brink

A year ago, it looked as if Sweet's Corners Elementary School was slated to be shut down; but on Tuesday, September 5, it welcomed new principal Valerie Horsfall, and started the school year bursting with energy and excitement.

In the face of the threatened closure, a dedicated school council - with tremendous support from staff, the school family and surrounding community, including members of both SBARA and the Lyndhurst Rejuvenation Committee - made a strong, rational presentation to the accommodation review committee. When the final report was drafted, our school was no longer included.

For 2017-18, the school is now home to a before- and after-school program offering subsidized care. It has a brand new track funded by the Township and school board, with long and triple jump pits alongside. It has a well supported 'sponsored hot lunch' program - new sponsors are always welcome!
